To complete the CJUS major, students must complete 40 hours of Criminal Justice coursework. This includes 19 hours of required coursework: CJUS 1511, 1200, 2340, and 2370, — as well as STAT 1222 or 1221 or 1220 — plus one course in CJUS Crime Analytics, and one Engagement Across Perspectives course. Also, 21 hours of CJUS electives are required. To graduate, a student must have an overall GPA of at least 2.0, as well as in the major, and complete 120 credit hours.

REQUIRED CORE COURSEWORK:

Criminal Justice students must take and pass ALL these core courses to the right with a "C" or better. Students may attempt CJUS 1511 and 2340 no more than two (2) times, including all withdrawals and grade replacements of D or F. Students will not be allowed to continue in the major if they are not successful in two attempts.
